

Kellie's Country Cabbage

This is a family recipe from Kellie Reeves, a member of the bookkeeping staff here at CBOPC.

8 Slices country style bacon, cooked crisp, finely chopped Reserve 2-3 Tbsp. of drippings 1 small head of cabbage/chopped/shredded coarsely 2 Tbsp. apple cider vinegar

2 Tbsp. water

1½ Tbsp. white sugar

Salt & Pepper to taste

Cook cabbage in bacon grease in a large skillet until preferred tenderness. Drain excess grease on paper towels. Add vinegar, sugar and water, salt & pepper, mix well, then toss with bacon pieces. Makes a great side to country style pork chop. • • •
