Small Business Can Create Jobs with Help of Community Banks

f the 700,000 plus registered businesses in Georgia, 97.5% are categorized "small" by the Federal Government. To be categorized "small," a business has less than 500 employees.

In Georgia, 95% of the small businesses have fewer than 50 employees. Almost 80% employ fewer than 10 people. 87% of Georgia small businesses employ 5 or less!

The top performing 1% of firms in any given year generate roughly 40% of all new jobs.

Given the above facts from the Georgia Department of Economic Development, why are we not hearing more about encouraging small business? I think some folks rationalize their non-concern by the fact that they are not a small business person and therefore lack of small business growth doesn't really affect them. We hear our politicians rant about taxing the rich, raising taxes across the board, cutting expenses, fair tax, health care, fixing our entitlement programs, immigration, and of course, our national debt! Blah! Blah!

While no one seems to belittle the fact that all of the above is extremely important (depending on your party or group affiliation), it seems everyone agrees that job creation is ultimately what will bring us out of this economic downturn. 

Simply Pleasurable Pork Chops!

This recipe was submitted by Liz Cole, Executive Director of Mountain Conservation Trust of Georgia. When asked the origin of the recipe, Liz responded, "The recipe was concocted while working overseas in a country that did not allow pork products. Craving and being denied one of my favorite foods led to the creation of a number of homemade recipes with pork as the star! One of the many things I learned overseas was cooking with simple ingredients. Long flights led to creative thinking and an immediate trip to the grocery store upon landing back in the States. Hope you enjoy this simple pleasure."

2 - 1" Thick Pork Chops w/ Bone Sea Salt Soy Sauce 2 - Oranges 2 - Garlic Cloves Fresh Cracked Black Pepper Frank's Red Hot Original Cayenne Pepper Sauce

Slice garlic cloves and insert equally throughout chops. Salt and pepper both sides of chops. Apply soy and Red Hot sauce on both sides of chops. Slice oranges with rind and place on top of chops. Cover and place in fridge for at least 1 hour. Prepare charcoal grill. Remove oranges and grill chops to desired temperature. Baste chops during grilling with soy and Red Hot mixture. Grill and baste orange slices. Place chops on serving plate and garnish with grilled orange slices.
